Behaviour Addendum - COVID 19

Context

This addendum is for use as children return to school. The threat of Covid-19 requires schools to have clear expectations, as there is a need for children to behave differently with new systems and safety measures in place. It is to ensure that we keep pupils and staff as safe as possible. These expectations have been written using the Department for Education's Behaviour Principles as guidance.

Toilets	Pupils must flush the toilets after use and wash hands thoroughly. They
	should try to only use the toilet during break times where possible. Only 2
	children can use the toilets at a time and this requires adult supervision.
Coughing and spitting	Pupils absolutely must not cough in anyone's face. They must cough into a
	tissue, hand or their elbow. Hands must then be washed. Spitting is
	forbidden.

What happens if a child breaks these rules?

Allowances will be made for the age and understanding of the children. Adults will continually provide reminders and scaffold children to reflect on how their actions impact others. Where a child repeatedly struggles to comply with the expectations and safety measures, an individual risk assessment will be made to review the appropriateness of their provision. Parents will be contacted by the Headteacher or senior teacher. Where necessary parents will be asked to collect their child from school.

Rewards for good behaviour and effort

A new dojo called "staying safe" has been created. This is to help promote the importance of our children being able to keep themselves and others safe. Adults will proactively give verbal praise where they see children making good decisions, following social distancing or using good respiratory hygiene. Children will be rewarded with these dojo points which will feed into the usual behaviour monitoring systems already in place.
